



After the death of our beloved Vidal Sassoon, who lovingly guided the NACOEJ Adopt-A-Student Program that bore his name through two decades, we needed another sponsor to lead our oldest educational program in Israel into the decades ahead.

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### AAS Sponsorships Enable Ethiopian-Israeli Students to Achieve their Potential

Since 1987, the newly-named NACOEJ/Barney and Rachel Landau Gottstein Adopt-A-Student College Sponsorship Program (AAS) has given Ethiopian-Israeli students the financial support they need for higher education.

While most Ethiopian students receive the first three years of college tuition from the Israeli government, all must pay for their living expenses, which include rent, food, transportation, textbooks and other essential educational materials.

Very few Ethiopian-Israeli families are able to help. In too many cases, financial burdens force Ethiopian students to drop out and take unskilled jobs. AAS scholarships provide them with the modest monthly stipend that helps them to stay in school and earn a degree which provides them with a profession and the key to breaking out of poverty.


Tsyona has very fond memories

## From Their Letters...


There is so much we can learn about the importance and joy of sponsoring Ethiopian-Israeli college students from the letters they write to their sponsors. Here are just a few examples:




"I hope that you are well. I want to share a bit of what has happened to me since my last letter...I want to tell you about my volunteer project at university. Over the past few months, we taught classes at different schools around Israel...We taught one class on Ethiopian

culture in a multicultural school. We used a creative method called 'constructing a dilemma'. We gave the children Ethiopian coffee called buna and while sipping it, discussed various dilemmas like, was there room to celebrate holidays marked by only certain communities in Israel within the wider Israeli context?

"Working with classes with and without Ethiopian-Israeli students was amazing. For the Ethiopian students, there was important added value when they saw university students from our community. This gave them a feeling of 'yes, I can'.

"Many thanks for your support!"






"Thank you very much for your letter. It is great to receive a reply and to know a little more about you. Thank you!
